

Hello, today (July 4th 1776) I just got news from a prominent source that the 13 colonies have just declared independence from the crown. As the boss of this newspaper company I want you and two other colleagues to get the scoop on this life changing event. This has to be your best work because this is front page news material! Here is what I want you to do:

RAFT

Role- Role of the Author (Journalist)

You are a journalist for the Pennsylvania Press. You will be creating breaking news articles about the Declaration of Independence with a partner. You and two other colleagues will write a total of four short articles for the front page of a newspaper.

Audience-

The audience that you will have for our newspaper are newspaper readers, mostly middle and upper class colonists. Many of the colonists will be purchasing this newspaper to find out news not only about the Declaration of Independence but other important news stories that would be relevant to the colonial period.

Format-

This would be the front page of the newspaper. Your newspaper product must resemble the format of a newspaper. You must include two pictures, a title, heading, captions, and the appropriate date (July 4, 1776).

Topic- The Declaration of Independence

To write articles to compose the front page of the Pennsylvania Press.

News Report- Write a news report of at least two factual stories.

- The purpose of The Declaration of Independence
- The key figures involved
- Where it occurred
- Events that occurred before or after the event

Interview – Create an interview with one of the key figures during The American Revolution period. You will need at least three lines of dialogue for the key figure and interviewer. Topics to include:

- Opinions that these people would have
- Events the person may have participated in
- Accomplishments these people have made

Possible historical figures to interview:

Benjamin Franklin, Thomas Jefferson, John Adams, John Hancock, Alexander Hamilton, Joseph Brant, and Abigail Adams

The following are other ideas to add to your front page newspaper

You must have four articles on your front page.

Report of Past Event/ Anniversary— Write a report of an event that occurred during the colonial time period. (Ex. Wednesday marks the 5th anniversary of...)

Things you'll need:

- The year
- The location
- The significance of the event
- Key people
- A summary of the event

Suggestions of possible events to write about:

The Boston Tea Party, Rides of Paul Revere, Battles, etc.

Obituaries – Create a few sentences describing a person who lived during the end of the Colonial Time Period/Revolutionary Time Period.

- Create a person/figure
- Describe who the person was (job, death, and life description that is historically accurate to the time period)
- How they died
- Who they are survived by

THIS PERSON CAN BE MADEUP, BUT THE EVENTS, PLACES, AND LIFESTYLE HAS TO BE HISTORICALLY ACCURATE

Other Evidence:
Formal Classroom Discussion, Participation in everyday lesson
The students will have a group discussion/presentation about their rafts they did with their group. They will explain to the class what stories were all included in their newspaper article and what they were about.
*********This performance task incorporates the arts by having students create art of the colonial time period in a front page newspaper. The students will use their artistic abilities to create an authentic looking newspaper.*******
In this performance task, the students will be utilizing a variety of multiple intelligences.
Multiple Intelligences:
Linguistic- students will present their front page news article to the class articulating what they incorporated in their paper
Spatial- students will figure out how they what to represent their information on the paper, almost like creating a collage.
Interpersonal- Students will be engaged with groups of three to create their newspaper article. They will be working on this assignment in groups cooperatively.
Intrapersonal- students may divide and conquer on certain parts of the assignment and may work on things by themselves.

Some thing remarkable has happened inside the State House as the Second Continental Congress has made one of the most important decisions in recent history.

Last month, Richard Henry Lee urged Congress to declare its independence from Great Britain and his resolution has come true as of this morning when Congress officially adopted the Declaration of Independence.
